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Women's Museum of California to Present Virtual Film Festival Women's Film Festival to Feature 23 Films, November 13 – 15, 2020

SAN DIEGO, October 20, 2020 - Each spring the Women's Museum of California presents The Women's Film Festival San Diego (WFFSD), a 3-day series showcasing the extraordinary talent of women filmmakers all over the world. This year, the entire series will be presented virtually beginning November 13.

"The Women's Film Festival San Diego is an effort to provide female storytellers a platform to share their work, connect with each other and a uniquely supportive audience," explained Executive Director Felicia Shaw. "We've been working hard to ensure that the work of these talented women is seen by a broad audience."

WFFSD is dedicated to decreasing the gender gap in filmmaking and supporting emerging women filmmakers. The Festival weekend hosts discussions for filmmakers to learn from other women in the industry and network with other women filmmakers.

The 23 films screened at the Festival showcase a diverse spectrum of talent both on and off the screen. This allows audience members who aren't usually represented in the film industry to finally be seen and heard on the big screen. Themes represented in the films include relevant and timely topics such as violence against women, women in health, coming of age, women in STEM, and humanitarianism/activism.

Featured films include *Ours to Tell*, a new film to commemorate the anniversary of Roe V Wade by Rayka Zehtabch, Academy Award-winner for *Period. End of Sentence*.

The Fight, an inspiring insider look at a team of heroic ACLU lawyers' battles for abortion rights, immigrant rights, LGBTQ rights, and voting rights, directed by Elyse Steinberg, Josh Kriegman, and Eli Despres. Immediately following the film there will be a pre-recorded discussion between producer Kerry Washington and the five ACLU lawyers featured in the film.

Ms. Diagnosed, a documentary film from Emmy Award-winning team Tricia Regan, Dr. Jennifer Mieres, Lori Russo, and Dr. Stacey Rosen, that explores the inequality in our health care system.

Mezquite's Heart, directed by Ana Laura Calderon, is the story of Lucia, a Yoreme (indigenous) girl in Mexico who fights for her dream to play the harp, which is traditionally only played by men in her culture.

WFFSD is an annual program for the benefit of the Women's Museum of California.
